Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations June 2022

These were shared at the village open meeting on 17th February. The team consists of Sara Mandeville, Stephen Parry, Sheila Hamer, Marilyn Pettit and Maralyn Parry. Please approach any of the team for updates and changes to the plans eg. changes of times. Many offers of help have been given & accepted. Ideas have been incorporated where possible.

Decorating Llandyssil: As with Dragonfest, we are asking if the community will decorate their homes with royal themed regalia, crowns etc. If there are any dragons left out around the village perhaps they could come out and a crown be added? The hall will be decorated with bunting, crowns, flags etc. If anyone has a balloon-blowing machine could we borrow it please?

Yarn Bombing: Jane Randall-Smith is co-ordinating this. If you want to get involved please contact her. Jane also suggested dressing in 1950s fashion - Go for it!! If you want to knit some decorations or have spare wool to donate, please contact Jane.

Main Ideas:

1. **Thursday evening 2nd June:** In the Hall, “Cuppa and a candle”, links to the beacon-lighting across the UK. Bring your own candle (in safety jar) to light at the same time as all beacons being lit. The Queen lighting hers at 9:15pm, we will be coordinating with the lighting of the Montgomery beacon.
2. **Friday and Saturday:** No organised events here. There will be activities around the area in Monty etc, and many families may wish to join in with the wider community. People will also want to watch the spectacle on TV.
3. **Sunday Morning 5th June:** Help to set up tables and gazebos, placing games in safe places. Organising food donations, flowers in jam jars on tables. Home-made waving flags: Union flag one side / Welsh flag on reverse, these will be made at the coffee morning.

4. **Sunday Afternoon 5th June:** Community Tea Party / Picnic (**No Alcohol**). The original idea was to ask people to bring a picnic, but has developed after so many offers of food came in. Bring your own picnic and / or bring something to the communal table. The time is to be finalised. We will cater for 100 people and everyone is welcome. Any food items are welcome and will be shared with everyone attending. Games and activities typical of the 50's are being looked at eg. hop scotch, pin-crown-on-dragon, photo taken with the queen, hoop-tossing games etc. In the hall, under license from the church, a video of the Coronation and the 'Life of Queen Elizabeth II' with suitable music will be shown. If you are able to offer refreshment support eg. cakes, rolls etc. please contact Sara Mandeville.
5. **Sunday Evening Social 5th June:** License will be taken out by MP. Social evening from about 6:00 until 9:30. Details to follow. Short royal quiz, teams of 4. Sourcing special prizes linked to Jubilee if possible. All the alcohol will be provided and we need you just to turn up and enjoy the evening. Please do not bring your own.
Monty Brewery have done a deal for us on a cask and Penarth vineyard has donated 12 bottles for the event (for use as raffle prizes and remainder for use at the social).
6. **Making a memento:** Calling all with skills to decorate small wooden plaques with a crown or other insignia. Each of the 240 homes in our newsletter delivery area to be given one. If you have the skills and wish to help

please email Maralyn: parry.m60@hotmail.co.uk .There are 5 volunteers at the moment making these.

7. **Memories:** We're asking for you to let us record your memories from The Coronation. A booklet will be made, so we want you to let us know about Coronation Year: where were you? Have you any photos, memories etc? Please let us know. If you can write down your memories and send them to Stephen, he will co-ordinate this - email us at ytymelyn@hotmail.com
8. **Coffee Morning 30th April:** This will raise the remaining funds we need to put on this series of events:
 - a. **Flag making:** Small paper waving flags to make, cotton crown flags to decorate the village made by you! Or crown a dragon you have in the garage. Session will be run by Imogen Parry at the coffee morning on 30th April. Everyone is welcome.
 - b. **River Of Hope:** Draw or paint a picture of what you hope the future will be. These can be laminated and displayed. Messages of hope from anyone to be displayed and kept for the future.
 - c. **Sales Table:** We have been able to obtain some really lovely items, many still in their wrappers, which will be sold on the day.
 - d. **Raffle:** If you have any unwanted items at home we would welcome them for the raffle or sales table.
9. **Sincere appreciation to the following:**
 - a. Brent Simpson from Llandyssil community, who we

met with at his company has presented us with a large jubilee sign which he has donated. He has offered more signs to support the decorating of the village. His suggestion of providing a wall display in the library in special recognition of all those involved and to show future generations who was present was passed unanimously.

- b. Daisy Bank Dairy has offered to supply all the milk needed for all the events.
- c. Monty's Brewery, Tanners Wines and Penarth Vineyard.
- d. And to everyone in the community who has come forward to offer help, food, music, washing up, time etc. This event cannot come together without your support.

10. Grants:

- a. Gwyneth has found us a grant of £500 from Abermule with Llandyssil Community Council towards the costs including the social event refreshments. The proceeds of the Coffee Morning on 30th April will also go towards the costs of our Jubilee celebrations.

Alcohol at the Hall

The Trustees met on 17th February 2022 to discuss the School Hall Lease which was agreed and signed in September 2008.

Our lease is with the Church in Wales - and overseen by the Church Trustees - who insisted at the time that events which included alcohol can only happen a maximum of 6 times per year. Each of these events **must have the permission of the Church Trustees** (note the Church Trustees are NOT the Hall Trustees!) and a **Licence from the Local Authority giving approval to go ahead.**

Like many community centres during the Pandemic, we thought we had created a 'loophole' by allowing people to bring their own drinks to events. This is not the case and has to stop.

The Lease cannot be renegotiated and the Hall Trustees are liable for any contravention of 'the rules'.

We do hope you understand.

Neil has been in touch with St. John's Ambulance and they are prepared to offer free training at the Old School Hall. This will involve a two hour session on how to operate the machine, but there has to be a minimum of six people to attend. Neil will contact St John's to check available dates. Edward Alexander Fishbourne, Rector Of Llandyssil 1882-90

Born in Wicklow, Ireland, about 1841, Edward Alexander Fishbourne was educated in Trinity College, Dublin. His half century of service to the church began in 1865 in his native Ireland, but he moved to Wales after the disestablishment of the Irish church in 1869. He served in Llandaff cathedral for more than a decade before being appointed to replace Rev. William Holt Beever as rector of Llandyssil in December 1882. Following his time in Llandyssil, he was rector in Newtown 1890-97 and vicar of All Saints, Gresford 1897-1915.

On 31st August 1882, he married Harriet Crawley, daughter of the rural dean of Monmouth, and the couple moved to Llandyssil a few months later. The baptisms of their three older children (Philip Yorke in 1884, Charles Eustace in 1885 and Nancy Harriet in 1887) were recorded in Llandyssil parish baptism register, and youngest son, William John Crawley, was baptised in Newtown in April 1891. The Rectory children probably had little in common with Llandyssil village children or those living in farmhouses and cottages across the parish. While most local children attended the village school, the Rectory children were educated at home before attending a public school. Three of

the four Fishbourne children died young. In March 1901, the oldest son died, aged 17 and a pupil at Marlborough College. The second son attended Malvern College before naval training at Woolwich and Chatham, followed by a commission in the Royal Engineers in 1904. He served in various capacities at home and overseas before retiring to the Special Reserve R.E. in 1913. Rejoining on the outbreak of war, he fought on the Western Front for just over twelve weeks before, wounded at Ploegsteert Wood, he was invalided home. When he recovered, he served at Chatham where he contracted spotted fever, the cause of his death in June 1915. He is commemorated by a war grave in Gresford churchyard. Sources have shed little light on their daughter who died on 30 December 1918. The youngest son, and his wife, lived to old age.

One of the social highlights of Rev. Fishbourne's time in Llandyssil was the splendid celebration marking the coming-of-age of Walter Buckley Jones of Cefn Bryntalch Hall. The community celebration was organized by a committee chaired by Rev. Fishbourne, with George Wroughton (Llandyssil's schoolmaster) as secretary and comprising some local farmers.

Soon after 11am on Monday 17th August 1885, people assembled near a large decorated arch at Green Lane before Newtown Brass and Reed Band led them in procession up the road to Cefn Bryntalch Hall. On arrival, the band played more tunes, then Edward Pryce of Henfron read the congratulatory address from Cefn Bryntalch estate tenants and Rev. Fishbourne presented the tenants' gift, a silver inkstand, to Walter Buckley Jones. He also received a

silver tankard and two goblets from the tenantry of the family's Newtown and Radnorshire estates, and Cefn Bryntalch servants, both past and present, gave him a silver flask and sandwich box. Stepping forward, Walter Buckley Jones was greeted by loud cheers and, after he thanked for the gifts, the band played For he's a jolly good fellow. His father, Richard Edward Jones, spoke about how the family valued the friendship and goodwill of their tenants, neighbours and friends, and that was followed by the band's rendition of Auld Lang Syne. Then it was refreshments for everyone present before they made their separate ways to Llandyssil.

About one o'clock, invited guests sat down to a formal luncheon provided by Messrs. Jones and Son of Newtown, in Llandyssil schoolroom. After the meal, Rev. Fishbourne proposed the loyal toast, then a toast to Walter Buckley Jones, and Edward Pryce of Henfron toasted the young man's parents. Further toasts to the guests, the health of Rev. Fishbourne and the organizing committee followed.

John Pilot of Newtown had erected a tent on one of the fields of Henfron where, according to a newspaper report, more than 1,500 people met at 3pm for a monster tea party followed by sports. Among the ladies who served the tea were Mrs. Bason, Cwmbadarn, Mrs. Pryce, Henfron, Miss Hughes, Green Lane, and Mrs. Lewis, Bryntalch. After tea, children and adults competed in the running, wheelbarrow and three-legged races, tug-of-war and high jump contests, and there were donkey and pony runs. One race was described in the press as Old Womens' race, and the first prize (a dress value ten shillings) was won by Mrs. Webster,

while Lizzie Taylor won the second prize (dress value five shillings). The day of celebration concluded with dancing to music played by the band.

Rev. Fishbourne's long church career ended in the autumn of 1915 when he left Gresford for retirement in Kensington, London. He died there in February 1929, and his widow died five months later. They were buried in Gresford's churchyard. They had seen three of their children buried in that churchyard and their surviving son was also buried there some decades later.

Montgomery Energy Group

MEG has been supporting Montgomery school in its Clean Air Zone campaign to ask drivers to turn their engines off. Idling engines add to air pollution which damages lungs, especially in young children. The RAC is backing a campaign to ask drivers to turn off. MEG purchased an RAC 'Clean Air Zone' banner for the fence outside the school and the Eco Committee helped to attach it to the fence. The Eco Committee have also drawn posters about the campaign to display around the town.

MEG has also been busy planting fruit trees. The trees have been donated by Cultivate in Newtown with funding from Social Farms and Gardens, and MEG has helped the school Eco Committee to plant 8 of the trees in the school playing field and plant a further 6 trees in the Montgomery Community Orchard.
